Chairman Burk called the meeting to order at 3:02 P.M. in the 3rd floor conference room of City Hall. Notice of meeting and agenda were posted on the City Hall Notice Board as required by law.

INTRODUCTION OF GUESTS

Burk introduced Charles Owens, the new Ward 6 Representative for the Authority, and he thanked him for being willing to serve.

1. Reports

- A. Receive a report from Dennis Totte with Bedrock Nursery regarding current landscaping and irrigation projects, provide direction to Mr. Totte on current projects and take action as deemed necessary.

Chairman Burk advised that Totte is out of state and could not attend the meeting. However, Totte has expressed concerns regarding the drainage project at City Hall. Burk said this project has turned into a disaster. He suggested sitting down with staff to discuss ways to improve this project. Burk said currently there is standing water in the drainage system, and it's starting to stink. He noted that the grass and plants around the drainage system are dead. The wires to the tree lights funded by the McMahon Foundation have been dug up and are no longer intact. The sprinkler system installed by Bedrock appears to have been torn out when the drainage system was constructed.

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Burk said several of the City of Lawton vehicles that are parked at City Hall are in poor shape (e.g., a flat tire). He noted that a lot of money has been spent on the beautification of City Hall, and these vehicles are not aesthetically pleasing. He asked staff if these vehicles could be moved.

Brown said a lot of these vehicles are currently being used by City Hall employees. Unfortunately, these vehicles cannot be moved. However, any vehicle that has a flat tire needs to be moved to the public works yard.

Burk asked that staff avoid blowing grass into the flowerbeds as they mow.

- B. Receive a report from Neighborhood Services regarding monthly updates on departmental activities and take action as deemed necessary.

Brown said Jernigan is on vacation and could not attend the meeting. Brown presented the June productivity report for Neighborhood Services. For the month of June, staff mailed out 841 administrative letters, 90 general letters, and 179 cost notices. No D & D resolution letters were mailed out in June. Council held 22 public hearings for D & D properties during the month of June, and 15 properties are on the D & D list that will be presented to Council on July 25th. Council voted to place two properties on the D & D list during the July 11, 2023 Council meeting – 4751 NW Motif Manor Blvd (Copper Ridge Apartments) and 4741 NW Motif Manor Blvd (Candlewood Apartments).

- C. Consider approving submitted materials for payment. - **STRICKEN**

- D. Consider approving the monthly Treasurer Report. - **STRICKEN**

- E. Receive a report from the Cultural Preservation Committee and take action as deemed necessary.

Reagan Williams, Arts & Humanities, advised that Jason Poudrier was unable to attend the meeting. She presented the report on his behalf. She said work is still being done to seal and preserve various City of Lawton artifacts before moving them to a climate-controlled storage unit with UHAUL.

Symuleski asked which UHAUL facility these artifacts will be stored at.

Burk said he believes they're being stored at the UHAUL facility on the corner of Fort Sill Blvd and Cache Road.

- F. Receive a report from Children United regarding the accessibility playground in Elmer Thomas Park and take action as deemed necessary.

Ezerski said a retaining wall has been installed at the Children United playground. He said they've added extra rock donated by Dolese to improve the drainage system.

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Klein said Dolese has agreed to donate 60 truckloads of rock and stone to be used at the playground – primarily to improve the drainage system. This has not been delivered yet. Klein said the City Council has approved funding for the playground in the amount of \$75,000. Max Sasseen has been working with City staff to arrange help with the transportation of the rock and stone from the Dolese plant in Elgin.

Christine James, Parks and Recreation Director, said some of the rock has been delivered to the playground.

Klein said Sasseen was able to get dirt donated from Lawton Public Schools, as they had extra unused dirt left over from one of their projects.

Klein said Children United will be hosting a country showcase fundraising event on July 29th at McMahon Auditorium. Once the concert has been paid for, the remaining proceeds will go towards Children United.

Ezerski noted that J.L. Stillwell & Kyle Dillingham will be performing at the showcase.

Klein said the fence that will be placed around the Children United playground will be similar to the existing fence at Elmer Thomas Park. She said Children United will be selling fence pickets as a fundraiser. These pickets will be engraved with the donors' names and used to construct the fence.

Klein said the dancing fundraiser will be held on October 21st. The dance teams are lined up, and they have been practicing for this event.

Klein said it's time to start networking to get help with tree planting and the irrigation system at the playground. She's spoke with a few wholesale companies in Oklahoma City, and one of them is offering to reduce the price of their 7-gallon trees from \$109 to \$89.

Chairman Burk said he believes he might be able to get the trees for free through the Shade Trees on Playgrounds (STOP) program. He said the trees surrounding the current playground at Elmer Thomas Park were obtained through this program. Chairman Burk noted that these trees were large when they were delivered, and it's a requirement to have a sprinkler system in place for them. He said he will reach out to a representative with the STOP program to inquire about obtaining tree(s) for the new playground.

Klein said the playground equipment has been ordered, and the swing is on its way. The swing will be stored in the armory building until the playground is ready for installation.

Chairman Burk said the Authority needs to budget for ongoing maintenance and repair of this playground. This way equipment can be replaced in the future as deemed necessary. He noted the importance of continuing fundraising, as unexpected but necessary expenditures will likely arise in the future.

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Klein noted that a video about the playground will be played right before the intermission at the country showcase on July 29th.

- G. Receive a report from Parks and Recreation regarding departmental projects and monthly updates and take action as deemed necessary.

James said her staff has been busy trying to keep up with mowing after all the rain we've been getting.

Chairman Burk inquired about the time frame for repairing the electrical lines to the tree lights at City Hall.

James said her department is short-staffed, and they've been focused on keeping up with mowing. She said they will get to the tree lights as quickly as they can, but they've also discussed the possibility of hiring an electrician to repair the tree lights.

Chairman Burk said Bedrock initially installed the tree lights, so they can bury the electrical lines if needed. However, some of the lights look like they many have been broken or damaged during the installation of the drainage canal. He also expressed concerned regarding the standing water in the canal.

James said the canal is meant to retain water for up to 24 hours and then drain slowly.

Chairman Burk said the drainage canal does not look pretty the way it was crafted. He said river rock may have looked better.

James said river rock was not available in bulk order. The only option would have been to purchase multiple smaller bags from Home Depot or Lowe's, and this would have cost a lot of money.

Tanner asked why the fountain light at Elmer Thomas Park has not been working lately.

James said she has investigated this, and it appears to be an issue with the timer. She has directed her staff to fix the issue.

Chairman Burk said he will drive by the park at night to see if it's working again.

- H. Receive a report from the Planning Department regarding ongoing LETA projects and take action as deemed necessary.

Brown said she has yet to receive an update from Scott Vaughn regarding the dome lighting at City Hall. She said she will follow up with him.

Brown said she and Branstetter have been working on the brick project that will be installed by the Veterans Center. Staff needs to ensure that Polar Engraving does not charge the Authority

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sales tax. Brown also noted that staff needs to consult with Alfred Espinosa regarding cost estimates for any work that may need to be done to the sidewalk before the bricks can be installed.

Chairman Burk said the Authority has previously discussed placing solar pathway lighting in Elmer Thomas Park going towards the anchor. He asked staff for an update.

James said staff needs to determine what type of solar lighting is already in place at Elmer Thomas Park so that they can obtain cost estimates to purchase additional lighting.

Tanner noted that the issue of charging sales tax for the brick project has previously been discussed. It was determined that because the Authority is simply asking for a donation and not actually selling the bricks, sales tax should not be charged.

Brown said staff will schedule a meeting to discuss how to move forward with the brick project.

I. Receive Monthly Ward Updates from Trustees and take action as deemed necessary.

Tanner said he has spoken with the buffalo soldiers regarding maintenance of the median flowerbed at 2nd and Gore Boulevard. The buffalo soldiers agreed to accompany him when he goes to Nissan of Lawton to ask for help with maintenance. However, Tanner said he is waiting for a proposed agreement to be drafted so he can present it to Nissan of Lawton.

J. Receive a report from the Communications and Marketing Department regarding LETA's social media accounts and publicity projects, provide direction to staff on said projects and take action as deemed necessary.

Pewewardy said citizen participation on the Authority's new website has been rising. There were four nominations for the July Yard of the Month competition.

2. Business

A. Consider approving the minutes of the May 10 and June 14, 2023 meetings.

Motion by Ezerski, Second by Smith, to approve the minutes of the May 10 and June 14, 2023 meetings. **AYE:** McConnell, Burk, Smith, Tanner, Ezerski, Symuleski, Jackson-Seeley, Owens. **NAY:** None. **MOTION PASSED.**

B. Receive an update from the Women That Vote organization regarding a statue to be placed in Shepler Park and take action as deemed necessary.

Patty Neuwirth, Women That Vote, said their organization wanted to honor Barbara Curry in some way after she passed. They are asking for permission to install a statue of Ms. Curry in the park. She also asked if there was a timeframe for when the sculpture garden will be installed.

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Chairman Burk said more fundraising has to be done before the sculpture walkway can be installed.

Neuwirth said they will place the sculpture in storage until more direction can be provided as to where it should be installed within the park. She noted that a plaque will be placed with sculpture. Neuwirth said her organization will also be placing dedication benches in the park.

James noted that the City of Lawton Memorial Policy should be followed, which would require approval from the City Planning Commission and the City Council. James said she will send Neuwirth the information she needs to get this accomplished.

- C. Consider a funding request in the amount of up to \$30,000.00 from the Lawton Girl Scouts regarding a Gold Star Award Project 911 Monument to be placed at the City of Lawton Public Safety Center and take action as deemed necessary.

Merline LeDay, Lawton Girl Scouts, gave an update on this project. They are wanting this monument to have some sort of waterfall backdrop. They would also like to display a QR code on the monument that, if scanned, would direct citizens to a video about 911. She said her organization would also be interested in seeking additional funding from the McMahon Foundation.

James said she does not believe this has gone through the proper approval process required in the City's Memorial Policy. She said she will investigate this and send Ms. LeDay the appropriate application to fill out if this has not already been done.

Chairman Burk asked for clarification on exactly how much funding this organization is asking of the Authority.

Ms. LeDay said they are asking for \$46,000.

Chairman Burk suggested this organization write a letter requesting funding from the McMahon Foundation.

Ms. LeDay asked if the McMahon Foundation will accept funding requests from individuals.

Brown said the McMahon Foundation should accept their request, but staff can draft a letter of support for the project if needed.

Chairman Burk said once it's been determined how much money the McMahon Foundation will contribute, the Authority can begin looking at how much money they can dedicate to this project.

No action was taken on this item.

- D. Discuss the Children United invoice process to include granting authority to Charlotte Brown and Susan Schlecht to authorize and make payment of invoices pertaining to Children United up to a total sum of \$20,000.00 and take action as deemed necessary.

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Chairman Burk said the Authority has previously voted to allow Brown and Schlecht to administratively approve invoices up to \$10,000. However, as playground construction has progresses, invoices are increasing in size and frequency. This will allow for invoices to be approved more quickly.

Motion by Ezerski, Second by Smith, to grant authority to Charlotte Brown and Susan Schlecht to authorize and make payment of invoices pertaining to Children United up to a total sum of \$20,000.00. **AYE:** McConnell, Burk, Smith, Tanner, Ezerski, Symuleski, Jackson-Seeley, Owens. **NAY:** None. **MOTION PASSED.**

- E. Review Yard of the Month nominations for the month of June 2023, and vote on a winner.

Pewewardy said there were two June Yard of the Month nominations – 1107 NW 75th Street in Ward 6, and 2513 NE Heritage Creek Drive in Ward 2. She said a third nomination was also received, but this property received damage from the recent storm and the nomination was withdrew for the time being.

Pewewardy said 110 votes were cast. 79% of these votes were for 1107 NW 75th Street.

Motion by Ezerski, Second by Smith, to select 1107 NW 75th Street in Ward 6 as the June Yard of the Month winner. **AYE:** McConnell, Burk, Smith, Tanner, Ezerski, Symuleski, Jackson-Seeley, Owens. **NAY:** None. **MOTION PASSED.**

- F. Receive an update on the Freedom Festival event and take action as deemed necessary.

Michelle Rosario, Outreach & Events Coordinator for Arts & Humanities, said the Freedom Festival was a huge success. This year included several new attractions and events, to include a soapbox derby and hotdog eating contest sponsored by Bar-S Foods. She said staff is working to integrate Lawton's hotdog eating contest with the national hotdog eating contest sponsored by Nathan's Hotdogs. Rosario said the event hosted multiple performers both Friday and Saturday night, and over 50 vendors participated in the event. She said the intensity and duration of the fireworks display increased from last year to this year. The Disney Princesses group attended the event, and the event offered multiple bounce houses to entertain children. Rosario said staff plans on making this event bigger each year.

Ezerski thanked staff for allowing the Great Plains AMBUCS to sell beverages at this event. This allowed the organization to raise over \$6,000.

Jackson-Seeley said her father Keith Jackson was heavily involved planning this event. She said in the past, the City has partnered with a hotel to offer a discounted rate for people visiting Lawton to attend the Freedom Festival. She also believes they offered a \$40 food voucher with their stay.

Rosario asked Jackson-Seeley to send her information regarding how this was done in the past.

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- G. Consider accepting a grant from the McMahon Foundation in the amount of \$50,000.00 to install the Gold Star Families Memorial in Elmer Thomas Park and take action as deemed necessary.

Brown said she sent a letter to the McMahon Authority expressing the Authority's support for this project, and a grant has now been officially offered.

Motion by Ezerski, Second by Symuleski, to select 1107 NW 75th Street in Ward 6 as the June Yard of the Month winner. **AYE:** McConnell, Burk, Smith, Tanner, Ezerski, Symuleski, Jackson-Seeley, Owens. **NAY:** None. ***MOTION PASSED.***

- H. Consider donating \$1,800.00 to Children United to assist with advertising costs with KSWO and local radio outlets as well as boosting on social media platforms to promote the upcoming Country Music Showcase fundraiser event and take action as deemed necessary.

Ezerski noted that as of yesterday, only 40 tickets have been sold.

Motion by Symuleski, Second by Smith, to donate \$1,800.00 to Children United to assist with advertising costs with KSWO and local radio outlets as well as boosting on social media platforms to promote the upcoming Country Music Showcase fundraiser event. **AYE:** McConnell, Burk, Smith, Tanner, Ezerski, Symuleski, Jackson-Seeley, Owens. **NAY:** None. ***MOTION PASSED.***

- I. Consider a funding request from Arts and Humanities in the amount of up to \$1,600.00 to help cover catering costs and hospitality for performers at the City of Lawton Birthday Celebration and take action as deemed necessary.

Rosario provided background information on the City of Lawton Birthday Celebration. They are requesting assistance due to increased attendance at this event.

Chairman Burk said the Authority should be recognized as a donor if they chose to provide this funding.

Tanner asked if the Authority has funds available to approve this request.

Chairman Burk said the Authority does have the funds available. However, the Authority needs to be careful with regards to how much money they are granting to avoid setting an unwanted precedent.

Tanner asked staff if they have solicited money from any other entity or organization to help cover these costs.

Rosario said she would have to ask Jason Poudrier.

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Motion by Tanner, Second by Ezerski, to approve up to \$1,000.00 in expenditures to help cover catering costs and hospitality for performers at the City of Lawton Birthday Celebration. **AYE:** McConnell, Burk, Smith, Tanner, Ezerski, Symuleski, Jackson-Seeley, Owens. **NAY:** None. ***MOTION PASSED.***

3. Adjournment

Motion by Symuleski, Second by Tanner, to adjourn the June 14, 2023 meeting. **AYE:** McConnell, Burk, Smith, Tanner, Ezerski, Symuleski. **NAY:** None. ***MOTION PASSED.***
